Texas Trails Council's first Leaders



The awesome task of unifying the former Comanche Trail and Chisholm Trail Councils into a smooth-running youth-serving organization falls to our new Scout Executive, the first Scout Executive for the new Texas Trails Council, Mr. Kent Brown.

Kent brings a long history of success as a professional Scouter to West Texas. A successful District Executive in the West Tennessee Area Council (Jacksonville) and later the Pushmataha Area Council, he was promoted to Senior DE in The Gulf Ridge Council in Florida. After a successful stint as Field Director and Financial Director in the East Texas Area Council, he was hand-picked to be the Financial Director for the large Jaxonville Florida Metro Council (serving 80,000 youth).

Family is his most important concern, and Kent can't wait to bring his wife Kim, his Eagle Scout son Keaton, and daughter Katheryn to West Texas.

Aside from his professional experience in Scouting, Kent is an Eagle Scout, and worked several years at Philmont as Wrangler and assistant horseman. He's worked on 4 Woodbadge staffs, and is a Vigil member of the Order of the Arrow.

Besides his family, he finds that hobbies help him keep a personal balance: he enjoys golf, horse back competition events, and backpacking.

Mr. Brown's vision for the Texas Trails council is at once simple, and a call to action for all Scouters. . . "To meld the best of both Council Divisions to service the maximum number of Scouts and families in the 17 county area of the Big Country."



We are happy to welcome the first President of the Texas Trails Council, **Mr. Pat Leatherwood**. Although born in DeLeon, Pat claims Dublin as his lifelong home.

Married to Lisa (a schoolteacher), he has a daughter (Amy) and Eagle Scout son (Lee) in Dublin High School. Pat counts Dublin High School, Tarleton State University, and the Southwestern Graduate School of Banking (SMU) as his Alma Maters.

Pat knows Scouting. A Cub master for 5 years, Scoutmaster for 15 years, and Venture Advisor for 2 years, he's Timber Tag and Woodbadge trained, Vigil member of the Order of the Arrow, Otena Lodge Chief, Asst Scoutmaster at the 1977 Jamboree, earned the adult God and Country award, is past President of the Comanche Trail Council, and a Silver Beaver recipient. Did we mention that he is an Eagle Scout?

After completing the one hour per-week we ask of our volunteers, Pat still finds time to volunteer as President of the Chamber of Commerce, work on the City Council, preside as Rotary President and Asst. District Governor for Rotary, work on the Dublin Economic Development Board, the Erath Committee on Aging, and teach Sunday School. When these and his full-time career as the Vice President in charge of technology and marketing at First National Bank leave him a few minutes, he answers fire calls at the Dublin Volunteer Fire Department (as he has done for 12 years). Pat Leatherwood's brand of volunteerism gets noticed. In fact, he was presented the Texas Governor's Award for Volunteerism in 1984.

Climbing and Rappelling

The BSA policy and Guidelines on Climbing and Rappelling have changed

Due to the increasing number of climbing/rappelling accidents during the activities, the new guidelines state that ALL the BSA climbing/rappelling activities MUST be supervised by AT LEAST TWO adult leaders trained and certified as Climbing/Rappelling Instructors.

The lead instructor MUST be at least 21 years old and the other instructor must be at least 18 years old.

SCOUTING FOR FOOD

The Chisholm Trail Council, in association with United Supermarkets and local food banks, conducted their annual good turn – Scouting for Food—on November 23, 2002. This annual food drive was again headed by the Order of the Arrow and helped the food banks and pantries across the Council.

Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, and Venturers will be picked up over 26,880 pounds of food, which stayed within the community in which it was collected.

Local Packs, Troops, Posts and Crews collected 13,514 pounds of food last year to make that drive one of the best ever. We almost doubled that this year!

Thanks to everyone who participated, in either collecting or donating the food.

Abilene Pinewood Derby

The Texas Trails Pinewood Derby was held in Abilene Saturday February 8, 2003. The location was at the West Texas Fair Grounds Round Building. Participation this year was greater than previous years with 33 Webelos, 46 Bears, 63 Wolves, 45 Tigers, and 21 Open Division entries. Youth Division entries were judged for Best Design, Most unusual, and Best Paint, before the racing began. The racing format was double elimination, and the 1st place car from each division completed for over all honors. VENTURING

Silver Award

This is the highest award that a Venturer Crew member can earn in the Venturing program. Four such awards were presented for the first time in the Comanche Trail Council.

They were presented to **Will Goen, Kirsten Henton, Andrew Rollins, and Elizabeth Rollins**. All are members of Venture Crew 2000 of Lampasas.

Leadership Awards

Councils may present two awards for youth and two awards for adults per year, for up to 50 crews or ships, and one additional youth and on additional adult award per year for each fraction for 25 crews or ships above 50.

The Venturing Leadership Award is presented to Venturers and adults who have made exceptional contributions to Venturing and who exemplify the Venturing Oath and Code.

Jeff Henton and **Lisa Rollins** were presented the adult award and **Johan Oosthuizen** and **Andrew Rollins** received the youth award. All are from Venture Crew 2000 of Lampasas.

HALL OF FAME

The Chisholm Trail Council inducted 11 more people (three couples and five individuals) into the Hall of Fame for their untiring and unselfish service to Scouting. Merit Badge Seminars

The McMurry Merit Badge Seminar and the Tarleton State Merit Badge seminars were successes once again.

This was the twelfth year that Tarleton State University hosted it, and the first year that Texas Trails Council held it there. Three hundred and seventy-six (376) Scouts from forty Troops, representing four Councils, participated this year. They worked on over 1,124 merit badges in thirty-seven different subjects ranging from Atomic Energy to Sculpture. Approximately one-third of the merit badges were completed in the two weekend sessions, with the boys receiving partials in the others. They will have to finish those on their own time.

In addition, Troop Committee training, Cub Leader Specific training, and New Boy Scout and Venture Leader Specific training sessions were held for adults.
